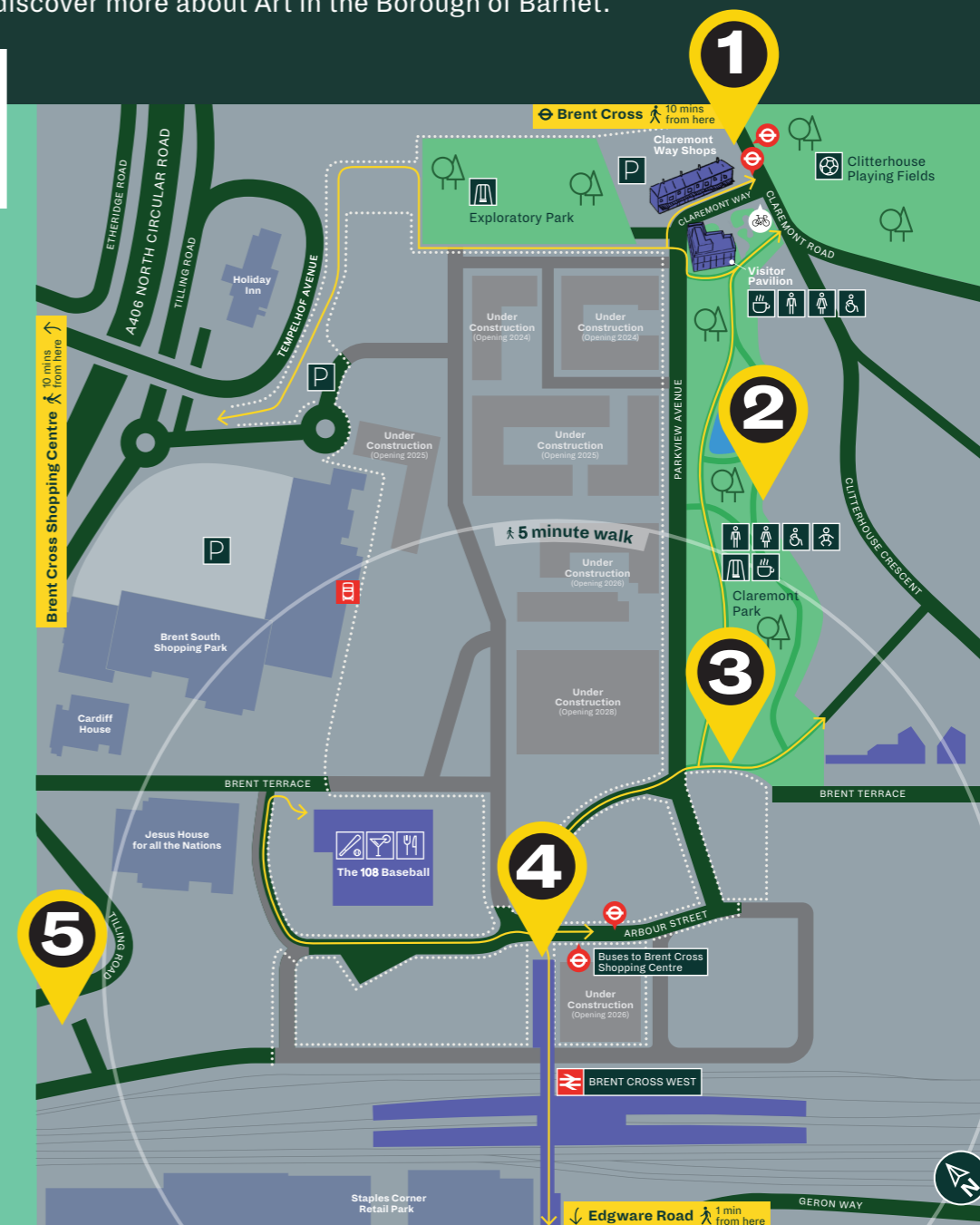




Brent Cross Town ART TRAIL

CLAREMONT ROAD



**Annu Kilpeläinen
Community Mural – 2021**

Located at the corner of Claremont Way and Claremont Road, this vibrant public artwork embodies growth, togetherness, hope, community and diversity. Inspired by local history, artist Annu drew from the contributions of William Cattley — a Barnet-based botanist — from 1788 to 1835.

Rainbow of Ribbons – 2022**

Head past Spruce & Larch and into Claremont Park where you'll find the Kiosk that houses Gussy's Ice Cream Parlour which is embellished with *Rainbow of Ribbons*. Conceived on a sunny day spent in the park observing children of all ages engaging with colours and shapes, the rainbow of metal ribbons evokes themes of play and sport. These ribbons, reminiscent of those used in PE classes, integrate physical movement and play into the artwork.

Yesterday, Tomorrow – 2023**

Keep walking through Claremont Park and you'll find *Yesterday, Tomorrow*, a heartfelt ode to the people and stories that have shaped the neighbourhood. This striking public work was inspired by the community, many of whom contributed their memories of the area to its design.

**Giles Round
Time passes & still I think
of you – 2023**

This new work by Giles Round combines personal memories with the significance of place in shaping identity. A poignant exploration of memory, love and loss, the installation emphasises the connection between buildings and the landscapes that define our lives. The artwork continues up the escalators towards the station concourse - head upstairs to explore Giles Round's moving dedication to his mother.

**Lakwena
Here we come, here we rise
– 2023**

Look north along the station concourse and you'll see *Here we come, here we rise*, which was created by celebrated artist Lakwena, in collaboration with architects IF_DO, as a wrap for Brent Cross Town's new electricity substation. Influenced by Eadweard Muybridge's motion studies, alongside fairgrounds and historic roadside structures, the 52m-long, 21m-tall structure aims to inspire and unite the Brent Cross Town community.
